When I was a teen, I used to look at the tree-covered hills surrounding Grace Fellowship Church and wonder if I could "do it." I would kind of scrunch up my eyes, furrow my brow, and concentrate.

Nothing.

I would repeat the sequence (scrunch, furrow, concentrate) over and over, each time with more and more intensity, until I would finally give up with a sigh. I did it for years. The results were always the same.

Nothing.

I thought, "Maybe when I'm a bit older, a bit wiser, a bit more [I don't know what.]"

Futility. My faith wasn't working. Forget mountains. I couldn't even get a pebble to move unless I kicked it. It couldn't be done and I was continuously devastated by my inabilities. I was a failure. God promised miracles, but my faith made a mustard seed look like the mountains I wanted so desperately to move.

I was right.

Have you ever tried to pick yourself up by your bootstraps? It doesn't work. The phrase used to demonstrate a hopeless situation, a worthless expenditure of energy and will. Nonsense. Somehow, we forgot that. It's now a badge of honor and grit for the self-made man, a source of pride.

Yep. My faith wasn't too small. My pride was too big! My pride was the mountain I couldn't move, the bootstrap I was trying to lift. No matter how much faith I could muster, it was never going to happen and no one held me in harsher contempt
