What does God require of you?

"This is My commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you." (John 15:12)

When God created man, He gave something very special to each of us—love. He intended for us to love Him and to love one another. Like a seed, when we follow Christ Jesus, and abide in Him, and follow His Commandment...it will root deep in our heart and grow up through the years into branches and soon will provide shade, strength, beauty, and fruit to whomever comes close to it. So the question is: do we live by loving one another as our Father loves us?

So many people walk through life with no goals, or they chase the wrong things, and then life becomes meaningless. They do not realize that what gives life purpose is when we are devoting ourselves to serving God by serving others.




Christ Washing the Feet of His Disciples by Dirck van Baburen (circa 1594)

Being humble is not a sign of weakness: Jesus illustrates by example how an obedient servant walks in the Spirit of our Father. (Selflessness) Serving others is not an easy task. We should realize that we are humans, filled with weakness, but we must not lock ourselves in a bubble so we will be perfectly safe. We need to know how to trust in God, how to obey Him and how to use a proper perspective that will guard us against stumbling.

"Are there not twelve hours in the day? If anyone walks in the day, he does not stumble, because he sees the Light of this world." [Jesus] (John 11:9).

Did you ever wonder what life would be like if God's people all "loved one another" the way our Father loves us? We would all meet the needs of each other and have compassion for one another. God wants us to know that service to others can occur in unlikely places and situations. Religious and political boundaries do not exist when everyone starts where they are. God expects more from His people than random acts of kindness or loose change from a wallet. He expects sacrificial giving, such as helping a complete stranger and even loving our enemies.

She laid her crown down: a tribute to Elizabeth Alexandra Mary Windsor (1926-2022)

On September 8, 2022, "Queen Elizabeth the Second, by the Grace of God, Queen of this Realm & of Her other Realms & Territories, Head of the Commonwealth, Defender of the Faith" died at what was her favorite earthly home, Balmoral Castle in Scotland. What most of us were probably unaware of was the fact that on that day she also laid down her earthly crown and was received into that Kingdom of which there will be no end. She found herself bowing to the One who had already been her King for many years. She had been looking forward to this!

As I learned of Queen Elizabeth's death at the age of 96, then watched on TV and computer screen as her British subjects grieved and prepared for and so perfectly carried out her funeral and burial services, I was certainly struck by her life of service and dedication to duty.

As the days went on, there was another aspect of this woman's life which became apparent in the words spoken at her services, in the glimpses of past film and video clips and in some of the published material: this woman had a true Christian faith and was a sister in the Lord.

True to British "reservedness" and, I'm sure, also due to "protocol," this deep commitment was never worn overtly by the Queen. When one can make the statements she did about her faith in God and be a close friend of Billy Graham for 30 years, it seems reasonably certain that she did "walk the walk" as best she was able as a British Royal.

Here are a couple of examples of what this remarkable woman was able to communicate openly about her deep Christian faith over the years.

1. "I know how much I rely on my faith to get me through the good times and the bad. Every day is a new beginning. I know that the only way to live my life is to try to do what is right, take the long view, give my best in whatever the day brings, and put my trust in God...I draw strength from the message of hope in the Christian gospel."

(Christmas broadcast to UK 2002)

2. In a message she gave to a gathering of Anglican bishops early in

ering of Anglican bishops early in 2022: "Throughout my life, the message and teachings of Christ have been my guide. In them I find hope. It is my hearfelt prayer that you will continue to be sustained by your faith in times of trial and be encouraged by hope in times of despair."

Not only does this give a glimpse into the relationship between Dr. Graham and Queen Elizabeth, but it also gives a moving history of the Billy Graham Crusades in the United Kingdom over the years.

As I viewed the service held in St. George's Chapel at Windsor Castle on September 19, I was struck by the video camera shot of Queen Elizabeth's imperial crown as it was removed from atop her casket and placed beneath the large cross on the altar of St. George's Chapel. It reminded me of the song, written by Chris Tomlin, which we sing frequently at Grace Fellowship: "We Fall Down."



We fall down
We lay our crowns
At the feet of Jesus.
The greatness of
Mercy and love
At the feet of Jesus...

For one reason or another,
I have not yet seen this correlation and/or Christian symbolism mentioned by anyone in the media.
Such a pre-planned act could not have been mere coincidence!

Obviously, the full story of Queen Elizabeth's faith will remain with God alone, but I personally look forward to meeting her, together with a myriad of others on my "bucket list," at the foot of the Throne or walking on the "streets that are golden" in Heaven one day.

To quote the most Reverend John Bishop, Archbishop of Armagh and Anglican Primate of All Ireland, at the conclusion of a Service of Reflection, delivered in Belfast on September 13 following his comparison of Queen Elizabeth to Mr. Valliant for Truth in Bunyan's Pilgrim's Progress: "And the trumpets sounded for her on the other side."
