ElderTalk: The Bridge of Love ANDY HEININGER

Several weeks ago at Teen DTS, I was blessed to share with the campers a metaphor: the bridge of love. This concept was not my own, but was shared with me by our Presiding Elder, Pastor Eric Byrom. The idea is to build relationships of love with one another that can withstand the weight of truth. The truth can sometimes be a heavy load on a friendship, and if the relationship is not built up first, it can topple. The building up process takes time and effort from both parties.

Let's look first at Matthew 22:39 where Jesus says, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." This verse is not new to us and is quoted frequently. But how do we love our neighbor as ourselves in our bridge building process?

My wife has reflected on this and summarized it with these thoughts. "I love myself 1) by meeting my own physical needs, 2) by cultivating my own spiritual growth in the Lord, and 3) by sharing with others and serving them to nurture relationships."

If we see others' physical needs and help them, we are loving them as we love ourselves. If we encourage them in their relationship with the Lord, we are loving them as we love ourselves. If we draw together to serve others (and also let them serve us through loving acts and shared experiences), it creates a cycle of loving one another as well as loving ourselves.

The love bridge is built by spending time together, sharing our hearts and dreams and our spiritual gifts, as well as our burdens and heartaches. These times strengthen this love bridge, but sometimes presenting the truth can be heavy. The truth can strengthen relationships, but it can also destroy them if not applied in the correct timing and with the correct intent.



One of my favorite quotes is from the movie *Harvey* with Jimmy Stewart. His character, Elwood P. Dowd, is well-loved by people, but most of them in the movie think he is crazy. He shares his personal philosophy with his psychiatrist: "In this world, you can be oh so smart, or oh so pleasant...For years I was smart...I recommend pleasant." In my opinion, this reflects the Apostle Paul's teaching of I Corinthians 9:22-23:

"To the weak I became weak, that I might win the weak. I have become all things to all people, that by all means I might save some. I do it all for the sake of the Gospel, that I may share with them in its blessings."

Paul built this relational bridge with others in order to share the most important truth in the history of mankind...the Savior has come, He loves you, He chose you, and He saved you! In the movie, Elwood's choice to be pleasant drew a listening ear to share his wisdom. Both men chose the relational path rather than the immediate path of truth. They built their bridges of love first, in order to have a willing audience to embrace the truth later.


A new look at the Crucifixion

It is now over halfway between Easter and the Advent/Christmas season. What a good time for us to be reminded of the events and reason for the life on earth of our Lord as it reached its culmination on that Roman cross at Jerusalem's Calvary hill in A.D. 33.

Some of us will remember reading, with amazement and enhanced comprehension, the details so well described by Jim Bishop, a Roman Catholic journalist, in his 1957 book, *The Day Christ Died*. Over the years there have been other more scholarly evaluations of that day and the event which changed history for all mankind.

New facts have come to light from various sources to enhance our understanding of what an amazing example of God's love for us Jesus' earthly life and death was.



However, a book has recently emerged covering not only the day of Christ's Crucifixion but the entire week beforehand. It includes an indepth study of the people involved, the prophecies fulfilled—closely following the biblical narrative, plus details related by both first century

Church Fathers and contemporary secular historians.

This time the author is a well-qualified Eastern Orthodox professor, biblical scholar, and lawyer, Eugenia Constantinou. Her book, *The Crucifixion of the King of Glory*, published in 2021 (Ancient Faith Publishing), is very readable, well documented and inciteful, yet not an overly scholarly account of the background, persons, and details of this event, which is literally at the crux of our Christian faith.

Throughout the book there are numerous facts and bits of background information which not only add to the reader's understanding of the subject being discussed but will also add to one's general understanding of the life and times of first century century Judaism, along with Judea and its Roman rulers.

At 350 pages it is "just right" in length, and its details will provide all who read it an even richer understanding of what it means to say, "Christ died for my sins." A highly recommended read! (My only "complaint" is that the book is only available in paperback.)

I hope that the author will undertake a sequel covering the days and weeks following the Crucifixion: *The Resurrection of the King of Glory*. I have recently discovered that she has given us a taste of just that. A series of podcasts were produced by Dr. Constantinou on Ancient Faith Radio beginning on May 2, 2022. These can be accessed at https://www.ancientfaith.com/podcasts/searchthescriptureslive and are recommended listening.

There is much available in print and online from both our Orthodox and Roman Catholic brothers and sisters which is worth our attention today. This book and its author's podcasts certainly belong in that category.
